
Today's Challenges for Rural Communities

Many small to medium sized British Columbia communities are facing serious Paramedic recruitment and retention problems. The current on-call staffing model means there is a lack of family-supporting paramedic jobs in rural areas. Also, the withdrawal of locally funded paramedic training has resulted in a steep decline of applicants in these communities. Today, we face critical staffing shortages in rural communities across the province.

This staffing shortage leaves many communities facing long periods of time with reduced or no ambulance service at all. With an aging population and increase in demand, it is even more important that all British Columbians have an active and reliable ambulance service in their community.

Along with staffing shortages, the regionalization of more and more healthcare services means patients face longer and longer travel times to receive the care they need.

The BC Emergency Health Services must respond to these challenges by adapting to local needs and implementing a new scheduling model that will attract paramedics to rural communities.







Roadblocks to Finding Solutions

Healthcare costs continue to grow and the need to find efficiencies within existing budgets is becoming more and more important. In order to maximize efficiencies, new healthcare delivery models need to be considered on a community-by-community basis.

Implementation of a new ambulance delivery model will require consultation and collaboration between government, BCEHS, paramedics, dispatchers and municipalities. Although the pandemic has created new challenges for our communities and healthcare system, it is imperative that a new service delivery model be made a priority – it cannot safely be delayed any longer.

No two communities have the same ambulance and healthcare problems, so solutions must be found which fit each specific area's need. BC Paramedics are a key part of BC's healthcare team and can be part of those solutions. Recent deployment advancements and expansion of rural Community Paramedics are examples of how the BCE-HS, the Ministry of Health and the Paramedics union can work collaboratively to find unique solutions.

Community Based Care - Community Paramedicine

Rural communities have benefited from the expansion of Community Paramedics (CP) into this setting. The success of this program in over 90 BC communities so far has meant better patient care and more stable job opportunities for 100 community paramedics.
